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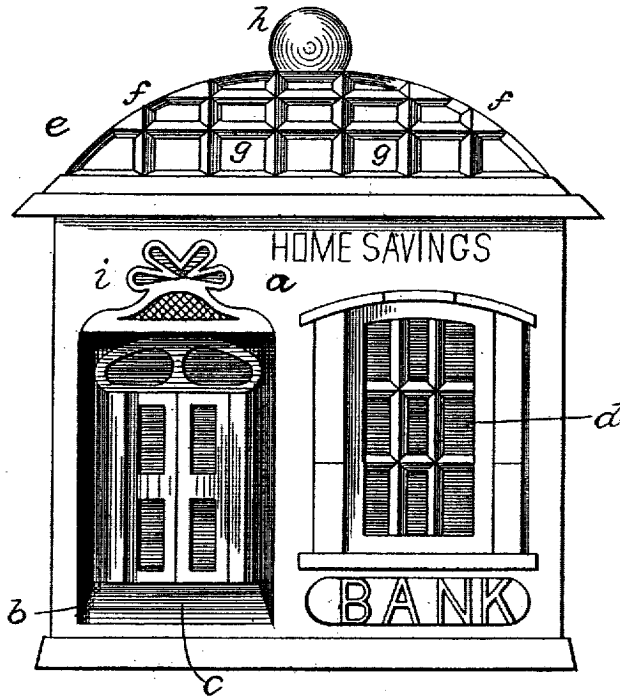

DESIGN FOR A TOY BANK.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Design No. 20,579, dated March 10, 1891.

Application filed May 12, 1890. Serial No. 351,562. Term of patent 7 years.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, RUSSEL FRISBIE, residing at Cromwell, in the county of Middlesex and State of Connecticut, a citizen of the United States, have invented and produced a new and original Design for Toy Banks, of which the following is a specification, reference being had to the accompanying drawing, forming a part thereof.

The figure shows a view in front elevation of a bank.

The leading features of my design, as shown in the front elevation of the structure, consist in its shape and conformation, that bears the general shape and outline of a one-story building. On one side of this front *a* there is arranged a somewhat deeply-recessed doorway *b*, the approach being by steps *c*, and at one side of this doorway is a barred window *d*. This front is surmounted by a roof *e*, that springs from the eaves on the four sides of the structure on curved planes, the meeting

lines of which form curves when viewed from either side. This roof is divided into panels *g* by a crosswise arrangement of bars, the panels being sunken. The top of the roof is surmounted by a finial *h*. The front of the building bears the inscription "Home Savings Bank" displayed in suitable letters. The lintel of the door is surmounted by an ornamental device *i*.

I claim as my invention—

The design for a toy bank, consisting of a box-like structure having on its front elevation the deeply-recessed door, with steps leading up thereto, and the ornamented lintel, the cross-barred window at one side of the door, and the curved roof divided into panels, as shown, with the globular finial surmounting the peak of the roof, as shown and set forth.
