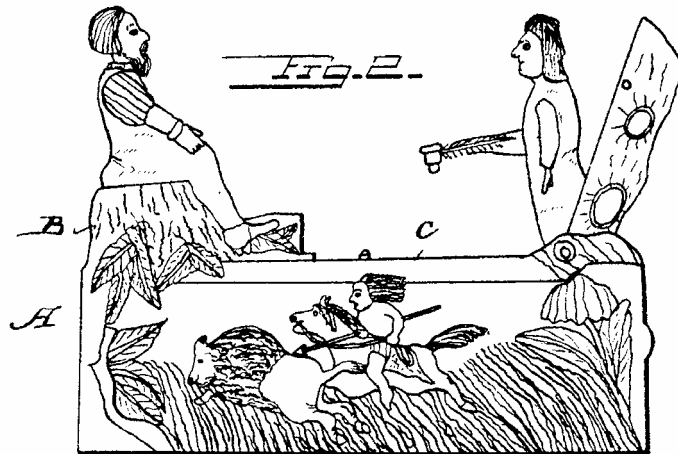

DESIGN FOR A TOY BANK.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Design No. 22,405, dated May 2, 1893.

Application filed March 16, 1893. Serial No. 466,357. Term of patent 7 years.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, CHARLES A. BAILEY, a citizen of the United States, and a resident of Cromwell, in the county of Middlesex and State of Connecticut, have invented certain new and useful Improvements in a Design for Toy Money-Banks; and I do declare the following to be a full, clear, and exact description of the invention, such as will enable others skilled in the art to which it appertains to make and use the same, reference being had to the accompanying drawings, and to letters of reference marked thereon, which form a part of this specification.

Figure 1 of the drawings is a side view showing the bank from one side. Fig. 2 is a similar view showing the bank from opposite side.

This invention has relation to certain new and original designs for toys, such as toy money boxes, the principal feature of the design consisting in a figure representing Columbus, seated upon a raised base, and facing the figure of an Indian standing upon the opposite portion of said base.

Referring to the accompanying drawings, the letter A designates the base portion of the design, which is shown as being of elongated box-like form, somewhat rounded at the ends. At one end portion said base is raised to form

a seat B, which has the appearance of the trunk of a tree sawed off a short distance above the ground. Seated upon this is a figure representing Columbus, while facing him at the opposite end portion of the base is the figure of an Indian in erect position, with an extended forearm in which is held a pipe. Behind the figure of the Indian is a convex-concave cover or shield, the convex surface of which has the configuration of a section of a log of wood. The base is ornamented by suitable figures either in intaglio or relief. In the drawings, one lateral face of said base bears a representation of a ship or caravel, while upon the opposite face is the representation of an Indian hunting buffalo. Between the figure of Columbus and that of the Indian, the superior portion of the base is somewhat concaved or hollowed, as shown at C.

Having described this invention, what I claim, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is—

The design for a toy, substantially as herein shown and described.
