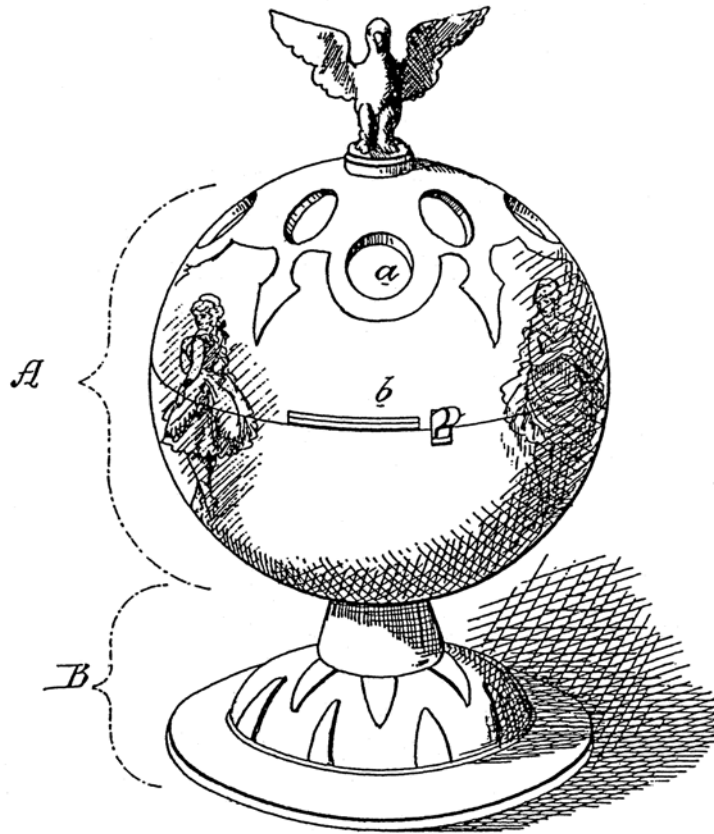

DESIGN FOR A TOY MONEY-BOX.

Specification forming part of Design No. **8,820**, dated December 7, 1875; application filed November 13, 1875.
[Term of Patent 7 years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, JOHN G. BAKER, of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, have invented a Design for a Toy Bank, of which the following is a specification:

The nature of my design is fully illustrated in the accompanying drawing; and consists of a hollow sphere, A, supported by a base, B.

The sphere has at the top a number of openings, *a*, and at the side a slot, *b*, and may be ornamented by any pictorial design. The base B is too clearly illustrated in the drawing to need description. The sphere may be surmounted with the representation of an eagle,

as shown, or may be ornamented by any other figure.

I claim—

The design for a toy money-box, composed, essentially, of a sphere, A, and base B, substantially as described, and illustrated in and by the accompanying drawing.
